Summary of All State Responses Regarding Transition of Sites to State
Brownfields/Voluntary Cleanup Programs

Has the Brownfield Law of 2002 changed when and how removal actions are conducted and how sites transition to a State cleanup program(s) after completion of the removal actions?

Initially, most respondents only looked at the question of if the Brownfield Law has changed if the site has transitioned (not how) to a state program. The majority of people (3 to 1) indicated there has not been any change. Some of the comments listed were:

- Does not resolve the issue of “liens”
- Reuse is considered more often
- Prefer their own state VCP over EPA enforcement
- Allows funds to be used for remediation
- Cannot use funds at on-going removal actions, must wait until completed
- Have hesitated referring sites for fear it would effect Brownfield eligibility
- Provides an opportunity to coordinate responses between state and feds’
- Can not use Brownfield funds to supplement removal actions
- Making sure funds are used in accordance to the law

Do Removal action sites transition to your Brownfields or Voluntary Cleanup Program, or do they undergo a cleanup under another state authority?

In a margin of 4 to 1, the overwhelming response was yes. The majority of the “yes” responses indicated that the program into which most Brownfield Sites went was the state voluntary cleanup program. A couple of states indicated that once the site is a Brownfield, it stays with the federal agency until complete. A couple of states also indicated that both state and federal agencies worked together to maximize resources to achieve a complete site cleanup.

Summary of All State Responses Regarding Coordination with States on Institutional Controls/Post Removal Site Controls

Are Institutional Controls (ICs) in place at post-removal sites?

The general answer is no, states say that they either are not in place, or they are unaware of them. Many states responded that it is inconsistent, and highly dependant on the level of EPA/State communication. Many respondents indicate that this is a problem they are aware of, and that they are either planning to address it or can't due to funding. Many states indicate that the only way they can reliably ensure that ICs are addressed is by moving the removal action site into a different program (usually a remedial program). Many also state that if the site is currently or expected to be an NPL site, then the issue isn't as important because the site will be receiving additional environmental attention.

If so, what plans are in place for inspection/follow-up to ensure the ICs are implemented and remain protective?

In general, states don't have programs in place for inspection and follow up. As above, many states try to move RA sites into remedial programs to ensure they get adequate environmental follow up in the form of ICs. Three states specifically mentioned UECA (or something similar) as either in progress or in place, and that this would require tracking of ICs at sites. Some states work through site-specific agreements to ensure placement of ICs at RA sites. A small number only do follow up on ICs if the site is fund-lead NPL. Of the states that responded, five have formal systems or programs in place to perform inspections or tracking. Some states specifically stated that they have no formal programs, and have no plans to ever have one. The majority are in the middle, they have no formal programs but have recognized the deficiency and the need to have something. Some states felt there was uncertainty about the state's authority to impose use restrictions at RA sites.

Summary of All State Responses Regarding Consideration of Property Reuse

Do you account for projected reuse of the property when a removal action is being planned or conducted? If so, how?

Many States answered that their clean up levels differentiate between restricted and unrestricted uses, so that when the future land use is known the clean up endpoints are identified as ARARS. Missouri's answer was typical of this:

“Missouri tries to, to the extent possible. If there is an immediate projected future use of a removal action property, it should be taken into consideration when designing the removal action to respond to actual projected future exposure scenarios. If a removal property does not have an immediate projected future use, then it must be cleaned up through the removal process to levels allowing for unrestricted future uses, or institutional controls, such as a restrictive covenant, must be placed on the property to restrict future uses to those for which adverse exposures are controlled through the removal actions.”

Other States noted that the Removal Action was primarily intended to remove immediate risks to human health and the environment such as Michigan:

“Not usually. The MDEQ has continued to focus its referrals to the removal program on sites that pose immediate and unacceptable exposure risks to public health and the environment.”

Recurring throughout the responses were observations that the State would try and anticipate future land uses where possible. This varied from looking at the actual land use of surrounding properties to working with planning entities to identify potential land uses.

Summary of All State Responses Regarding Coordination of Removal Actions
Conducted by Other Federal Agencies

Are there federal agencies (e.g., DOD, DOE, BLM) other than EPA taking the lead at removal action sites?

- **Which federal agency (or agencies)?**
- **How/does the State coordinate with the lead agency?**
- **Are there differences in the removal action process?**

Several States indicated they have worked with other federal agencies where those agencies have taken the lead in performing removal actions on their own properties. The Department of Defense, Department of Energy, US Army Corps of Engineers, US Air Force, Bureau of Land Managers, Government Services Administration, the Federal Aviation Administration, the Forest Service and the National Park Service were among the agencies implementing removals.

The level of coordination with the lead federal agency varies among States from “very little” to “good”. Prevalent among the responses was State’s use of Federal Facility Agreements and Defense State Memorandum of Agreements (DSMOA) to enhance coordination of removal actions with remedial activities. States that specifically mentioned use of these agreements include Kentucky, South Carolina, Illinois, and Michigan.

States reported that sometimes there are differences in the removal action process. Examples cited included lack of knowledge by the agencies, inconsistency in requesting State ARARs, little opportunity for involvement by the State agency, or the concern of the cost of the project relative to risk reduction to acceptable levels. Many States also indicated a lack of communication with these federal agencies, and that improvements could enhance coordination for removals at federal facilities. In Utah’s experience, there have been cases where the federal agency has perceived the removal action as the final action required at the site, but contaminated groundwater, surface water, and/or sediments remain at the site. Overall, States try to make sure there is consistency when informed of the removal intent and try to ensure that the federal agency follows the requirements under CERCLA and the NCP.
