SECAP Purpose



The SECAP is a strategic planning and budgeting document that presents the approach a BLM State Office will use to address its environmental cleanup requirements

- Provides visibility to the State Director & Senior Leadership of the magnitude of the current and future cleanup challenges.
- Serves as a **collaborative** process with BLM-HQ and State Offices to identify five-year strategy and cost linked to contaminated sites, Locations of Concern (LOCs), & Physical Safety Features.
- Assists BLM-HQ to **capture all** the environmental cleanup requirements and/or contaminated sites and serves as a document of record for BLM-HQ and interested regulator/stakeholder/public.
- Assists PMs to develop a strategy to address sites and ensures sites have a **future way-ahead**.
- Assists BLM-HQ in participating in the **budget process** to identify cost requirements to justify & defend budget requests.
- Provides recorded & **visible** status on community involvement and Environmental Justice considerations which are required and key to the Administrations Goals.
- Creates **confidence** in the public that the BLM is committed to cleanup on Public Lands.



SECAP Descriptions



- Site ID/Name, Location (Lat/Long, City/County, State), Field Office
- Project Lead Assigned (Y/N) – Resource Required
- Regulatory Driver, Contaminants, Affected Media, Current Phase
- Site Description
- Cleanup/Exit Strategy
- Milestones/Community Involvement
- Costs for next 5 fiscal years, and total cost-to-complete
- Program Management Costs if cleanup actions funded by another agency
- Photographs/Maps



SECAP In Summary – The Five W’s



- WHO: BLM-National Program Leads, BLM State/District/Field Office Leaders, Federal and State Agency’s, Tribes, Stakeholders, and BLM/USACE-Designated Contractor support.
- WHAT: Draft State Environmental Cleanup Action Plans.
- WHEN: Annually.
- WHERE: Each State may host a SECAP Workshop (virtually as well) to finalize their annual SECAP.
- WHY: To provide each State a strategic tool that identifies all contaminated sites, LOC’s and AML Physical Safety Features on BLM managed land (not just Abandoned Mine Lands/HAZMAT Program sites), to have a documented overall plan that considers cleanup phases/steps, performance, priority, and progress for each site, and to determine the costs associated with those sites to assist in the BLM budget process.
